## WHAT THIS ASSET COVERS

- Capture windows for gathering notes, screenshots, metrics, and quotes while the work is still fresh
- A structure for shaping those assets into short, medium, or flagship case stories
- A publishing ladder so the same story can support results pages, FAQs, service pages, and outreach

## USE THIS WHEN

1. You have wins but almost no usable case-study output
2. The team forgets to capture proof until the details are stale
3. You want a stronger proof system than occasional ad hoc stories

## WORKING ASSET

Capture the raw material for strong case stories before the details disappear.

## CAPTURE WINDOWS

The best case-study material usually appears in four windows:

- right before the work starts
- during the key intervention

- at the first visible outcome
- during the follow-up or stabilization phase

If those windows pass, the case story usually gets weaker fast.

## WHAT TO CAPTURE

- screenshots
- baseline metrics
- workflow pain points
- customer quotes
- before/after observations
- operator notes
- timeline and next-step details

## STORY STRUCTURE

Use a compact story spine:

1. Situation
2. Friction
3. Intervention
4. Outcome
5. Why it matters

This gives you enough structure for a short proof block or a flagship case page.

## EVIDENCE LADDER

Rank evidence from strongest to lightest:

- attributable metrics
- attributable quote
- screenshot or visual proof
- operator observation
- structured before/after note

Use the strongest evidence available, but do not wait for perfect evidence to publish every story.

## APPROVAL FLOW

Create a clear approval path:

- capture owner collects raw material
- marketer or operator shapes the story
- sensitive details get reviewed
- final publish owner approves public use

Track consent and confidentiality status with every story.

## **PUBLISHING LADDER**

One case story can support several surfaces:

- proof strip on a service page
- result block on a results page
- FAQ example
- blog/article deep dive
- sales follow-up asset

Publish the lightest useful version first, then deepen later if the signal is strong.

## **STORY QUALITY CHECKS**

Before publishing:

- does the story explain what changed?
- is the evidence real and supportable?
- does it sound specific rather than generic?
- does it help a buyer understand fit or confidence?

## **MONTHLY REVIEW**

Every month:

- review which stories were captured
- identify which ones deserve promotion to stronger surfaces
- note missing industries, service lines, or proof types

## **30-DAY INSTALLATION**

### **WEEK 1**

- define capture triggers
- assign story owners

## WEEK 2

- pilot the first 3 stories
- test the approval workflow

## WEEK 3

- publish light versions
- connect them to results and service pages

## WEEK 4

- review what worked
- improve the template and routing

## DEPLOYMENT NOTES

### HOW STRONG TEAMS ACTUALLY USE THIS ASSET

- Assign one accountable owner instead of letting "Case Study Capture Playbook for Small Businesses" become shared but unmanaged work.
- Use it with owners, operators, marketers, and client-facing teams responsible for turning real work into usable proof in a weekly rhythm so the asset drives decisions rather than sitting in a folder.
- Decide in advance what counts as green, watch, and red performance so the team knows when to escalate.
- Capture learnings directly in the document every week so the asset becomes smarter over time instead of resetting to zero.

### BEST DEPLOYMENT SEQUENCE

- You have wins but almost no usable case-study output
- The team forgets to capture proof until the details are stale
- You want a stronger proof system than occasional ad hoc stories

### WHAT SEPARATES A SERIOUS VERSION FROM A BASIC TEMPLATE

- Clear ownership for every step, not generic advice without accountability.

- Targets, thresholds, or decision rules that tell the team what good looks like.
- Specific working components: Capture windows for gathering notes, screenshots, metrics, and quotes while the work is still fresh, A structure for shaping those assets into short, medium, or flagship case stories, A publishing ladder so the same story can support results pages, FAQs, service pages, and outreach.
- A built-in review cadence so the document becomes part of operations rather than a one-time download.
